

# Horniman Café 'cans' bottled water in latest move to ditch single-use plastics

The Café at the Horniman Museum and Gardens is no longer stocking bottled water, instead offering visitors a choice of tap water refills or canned spring water.

The move away from bottled water – which came into effect on 1 April – is part of the south London attraction's commitment to reduce single-use plastics, aiming in time to ditch them altogether from its site.

## The Horniman has already:

- replaced single-use takeaway plastics in the Café with Vegware products made from plants, including disposable coffee cups and straws
- introduced a plastic bag charge in its gift shop, with proceeds supporting its pioneering Project
   Coral conservation research
- installed a new water bottle refill point in the Gardens, one of more than 20 across London provided by the London Drinking Fountain Fund, which is led by #OneLess and the Mayor of London
- joined the #OneLess campaign, a rapidly growing movement of pioneering and progressive communities, business, and NGOs working to change the way people drink water in London and reduce the number of single-use plastic water bottles entering the ocean from London.

The Horniman Café's pre-packaged spring water will be supplied by CanO Water, using aluminium cans. Although still a single-use product, aluminium cans are a more sustainable choice than plastic bottles as they are more commonly recycled by consumers, and are infinitely recyclable. Stocking canned water in the Horniman Café will mean 24,000 single-use plastic bottles per year are no longer being thrown away or recycled.

Brad Owen, Head of Commercial at the Horniman Museum and Gardens, says: 'Ditching plastic water bottles is a major step towards ridding the Horniman of single-use plastics but it's by no means the end of the process. We're currently looking at alternative bags for the shop, and developing our own-brand reusable bottles and coffee cups to offer our visitors even more and even greener options.'

The Horniman's commitment to combating plastic waste and raising awareness of the damage it does to the natural world will also be seen by visitors in numerous events and exhibitions this year, starting in May with a series of commissioned works by visual artist Claire Morgan, drawing on the theme of waste and the impact that humans have on their surroundings.

- The #OneLess campaign has been leading the charge against ocean plastic pollution since 2016, focusing on the pervasive single-use plastic water bottle. #OneLess is leading a 'refill revolution' in London, transforming the capital into a place where single-use bottled water is a thing of the past and where plastic waste is drastically reduced for the sake of the ocean.
  #OneLess is led by the Zoological Society of London, in partnership with Forum for the Future, The International Programme on the State of the Ocean, and the Thames Estuary Partnership and is working with major London attractions and businesses, as well as the Mayor of London, to find and implement solutions to eradicate plastic bottled water and enable a refill culture across our city. - CanO Water was created in response to the damaging impact that plastic bottles have on the environment, after a trip to a remote island opened the eyes of three close friends. With approximately 8 million tonnes of plastic ending up in the ocean each year, CanO Water is an infinitely recyclable alternative to plastic bottles. Recycle your can and it will be back on the shelf in as little as 6 weeks. canowater.com
- Project Coral is an innovative coral reproductive research project led by the Horniman Aquarium with
  international partners. The Horniman Aquarium has been pioneering research into developing techniques
  to stimulate coral sexual reproduction, and became the first institution globally to successfully induce
  predictable broadcast coral spawning as well as the first successful in-vitro fertilisation of captive corals in
  the UK. Project Coral's breakthrough of controlled captive coral spawning will support coral research
  facilities all over the world, by opening up opportunities to examine the effects of climate change, aid

- The Horniman Museum and Gardens opened in 1901 as a gift to the people in perpetuity from tea trader and philanthropist Frederick John Horniman, to 'bring the world to Forest Hill'. Today the Horniman has a collection of 350,000 objects, specimens and artefacts from around the world. Its galleries include natural history, music and an acclaimed aquarium. A new World Gallery of anthropology opened in June 2018 and a new arts space, The Studio, opened in October 2018. Indoor exhibits link to the award-winning display gardens from medicinal and dye gardens to an interactive sound garden, Butterfly House and an animal walk set among 16 acres of beautiful, green space offering spectacular views across London. <a href="https://doi.org/10.1001/john.com/horniman.ac.uk">horniman.ac.uk</a>
- The Horniman Museum and Gardens is core-funded by the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) and since 1990 has been governed by an independent charitable trust, registered charity no. 802725. The Horniman Museum and Gardens also receives funding from Arts Council England as one of its National Portfolio Organisations.
- Opening times and admission. The Horniman Museum is open daily 10am-5.30pm, except 24 26
  December, when it is closed. The Gardens open at 7.15am Monday to Saturday and 8am on Sunday and
  Bank Holidays, and close at sunset. Entry to the Museum and Gardens is free but charges apply for the
  Aquarium, Butterfly House and some special exhibitions and events. Horniman Members and
  Benefactors go free horniman.ac.uk/members.
- Access. The Museum and the Gardens are both wheelchair and pushchair friendly with accessible

- Travel. The Horniman is situated at 100 London Road, Forest Hill, London SE23 3PQ on the South Circular Road (A205). It can be reached easily by train to Forest Hill station (London Overground/Southern, travel time approx.15-20 minutes from east/central London or East Croydon) and by local buses (176, 185, 197, 356, P4).
