

Join the Dinosaur rEvolution at the Horniman

Visit Dinosaur rEvolution – opening at the Horniman in February 2024 – and change the way you think about dinosaurs forever.

The first UK showing of Dinosaur rEvolution highlights discoveries from recent decades which have changed the way we picture dinosaurs – not all as scaly green reptiles but many with an array of colours, feathers, quills and spikes.

The colourful and fascinating exhibition also shows how prehistoric dinosaurs and modernday birds are related, and poses the question 'Did *T. rex* have feathers?'

Five large animatronic dinosaur models – including a 7m-long *Tyrannosaurus* – are the stars of the show, alongside vibrant and detailed artworks by artist and exhibition curator Luis V. Rey. Also included are touchable fossil casts, dino games, dressing-up and more.

Among the dinosaur specimens on display are casts of the horned skull of a *Diabloceratops*, the claw of a *Therizinosaurus*, and skeletons of *Velociraptor* and *Compsognathus* – a chicken-sized, feathered dinosaur.

Louis Buckley, Senior Curator at the Horniman Museum and Gardens, says: 'It's amazing we now have fossils that show us that some dinosaurs were covered in feathers. This exhibition really brings to life dinosaurs in all their diversity – feathers, scales, spikes and all – and reveals the incredible fact that dinosaurs are still very much with us, in the birds we see every day.'

Dinosaur rEvolution is a travelling exhibition produced by Gondwana Studios.

Dinosaur rEvolution opens at the Horniman on Saturday 10 February 2024 and runs until Sunday 3 November. Tickets will be on sale from January at horniman.ac.uk. Horniman Members and Benefactors enjoy free, unlimited entry.

- A dinosaur-based children's craft activity for February half term. The 'Create your own clay dinosaur sculpture' workshops, delivered by expert ceramicists Maison S Sommet from Peckham, will run four times a day, from Monday 12 to Thursday 15 February.

 need a quieter environment when visiting the Horniman.

- The Horniman Museum and Gardens opened in 1901 as a gift to the people in perpetuity from tea trader and philanthropist Frederick John Horniman, to 'bring the world to Forest Hill'. Today the Horniman has a collection of 350,000 objects, specimens and artefacts from around the world. Its galleries include natural history, music and an acclaimed aquarium, alongside a World Gallery of anthropology and a flexible arts and exhibition space, The Studio. Indoor exhibits link to the award-winning display gardens from medicinal and dye gardens to an interactive sound garden, Butterfly House and an animal walk set among 16 acres of beautiful, green space offering spectacular views across London. horniman.ac.uk
